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

Review

Do not use the phrase "Lay Down" or "Down" until your dog has the motions mastered. Dog may get confused and act


out.



1.Make sure your dog knows how to sit before you try to teach it how to lay down.



2. After dog is sitting, put a treat in your hand and make a **fist**. Face your fist upward so your dog can smell the treat.




3. After your dog notices the treat, drop your closed fist slowly straight down to the floor.



4.Drop your fist until your dog **hunches** over.



5. Drag your fist toward you and keep it on the ground. Your dog should **stretch** all the way out.



6.Once your dog is completely down, **praise** them by cheering, "Yes!" and give them a treat.



Conclusion

Practice makes perfect. Teaching a dog to lay down takes time and a good **attitude**.

Glossary

Fist- When one's hand is closed tightly with fingers curled in.

Hunches- Bent or curled over.

Stretch- To extend or contract body parts or objects.

Praise- Positive feedback (can be words or physical actions).

Attitude- A person's outlook on a certain matter (can be positive or negative).
