WHAT IS A GOVERNMENT DOCUMENT?



"Government documents is a blanket term used to categorize any information disseminated by a government agency. As such, material produced by government bodies at the local, state, federal, and international level, in addition to government-funded agencies and organizations, are all considered government documents." (Jennifer Morgan, Jerome Hall Law Library, Indiana University)



WHAT IS THE FEDERAL DEPOSITORY LIBRARY PROGRAM?



- The Federal Depository Library Program (FDLP) was initiated by Congress in 1813 to ensure the American public's access to the Government's information through designated libraries. Today the Government Publishing Office (GPO) oversees the program under the authority of Title 44 of the United States Code. Approx. 1,100 Federal Depository Libraries exist across all 50 states.
- The UI Library joined the FDLP in 1907 and became a regional depository for Idaho in 1967; the Library acquires 100% of documents issued by the GPO.



HOW ARE GOVERNMENT DOCUMENTS ARRANGED?

- Organized by the Superintendent of Documents (SuDoc) alphanumeric classification system.
- Each document is classified by issuing agency (Congress, government department, agency or commission), not subject.
- Most SuDoc numbers use the following format:

How to Locate a U.S. Government Publication

U.S. Government publications in this collection are arranged by the Superintendent of Documents classification number. Publications are grouped together by issuing agency. To ensure that you find all of the materials available on a particular subject, be sure to check the databases or indexes recommended by your librarian.

The example below shows how the Superintendent of Documents classification number PREX 3.15:2014-15 is constructed for the publication The World Factbook:

- UI Library Research Guide on Government Information available with more information on accessing materials.




FINDING GOVERNMENT DOCUMENTS IN PRINT AT THE U OF I LIBRARY

- FDLP Resource Guides includes links to various topics from many agencies (health, environment, education, civil rights, science, etc.)
- GovInfo search, browse, and download over 2 million U.S. government publications
- State Agency Databases Project (maintained by GODORT)


